"For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future." Jeremiah 29:11

"They don't know how to dream." That was one of the first things we were told about the children when we began working in El Salvador. We thought every child of God had the same opportunities that we have. But we were so wrong. We quickly learned that the very young Salvadoran children have dreams of what they want to be – policeman, president, princess – but as they get older, they realize that goals, plans, and dreams are for other people and not for them. Their dreams aren't any higher than the curb, because no one has told them that they can reach for the stars.

If you saw where they lived, perhaps you'd better understand why they don't know how to dream. Children in our neighborhood are born into a vicious cycle of poverty and low expectations, going back generations. SHIP is trying to break that cycle, one precious kid at a time. You see, we believe that every life, every mind, every future is a sacred and precious gift from God. We believe it's important to tell them that they are loved not just by us, but that they are loved and valued by Jesus. And they are included in God's promise of a hope and a future despite their current circumstances.

Zuleyma is 16 years old and in 9th grade. In January, she realized that she had come to the end of her educational road because her dad had lost his job, her parents couldn't afford to continue sending her to private school, and the public school was just too dangerous to attend. But she heard about the SHIP *sponsorSHIP* program, which sends kids to safe, private Christian schools and offers tutoring for them in the afternoons. So she applied. "I was so sad that I couldn't go to school, but now I am happy because SHIP opened the door for me to go to a good school!" She's dreaming now of becoming a doctor.

Jocelyn is 14 years old and in the 7th grade. She is in her fourth year with the *sponsorSHIP* program. When she first came to SHIP, taking a test scared her to death, but through the love and nurturing she received in tutoring, she has overcome that fear, and last year she was one of our star students. She's dreaming of being a nurse.

"Hi! I can speak English," is how 13-year-old Ceci greeted the SHIP mission team that came to build a house near her home. Actually, after that greeting, we found that we had heard her entire English vocabulary. But that didn't stop her from communicating herself right into our *sponsorSHIP* program. She's in her second year, and her infectious smile and big hugs will make you a fan of Ceci. She's dreaming of being an accountant.

Their futures are brighter because they are receiving a quality education, thanks to SHIP's donors and the *sponsorSHIP* program that provide funding for tuition, books, uniforms, supplies, tutoring, and an extra measure of the love of Jesus. They're learning and discovering that they CAN succeed.

Unfortunately, there are so many more children we can't help because of a lack of funding and staff. On every trip to El Salvador, moms come to our gate begging us to allow their child into the program. Currently, we have more than 50 students, but that number could easily double, if we had funding and staff.

Trusting Him More

I've been on mission trips before; we've done a mission trip domestically, and my children have participated in many mission opportunities over the last six years. However, this mission trip was different. Each time I serve God, He grows me in new ways. He knows who we are. He knows our strengths and weaknesses and who else will show up to work beside us on mission.

I'm a planner. I love to get a group of people together, find out what they enjoy doing, and watch it all come together with a well-executed plan. Nothing thrills my heart more. This summer, He taught me not just the head knowledge of that but the heart knowledge as I watched Him bring together 13 people from my church, Parkway Baptist in College Station, Texas, and others from local bodies of Christ who were ready to do whatever they were called to do.

The first day was a real challenge for me. After leaving for the airport at 4 a.m., we showed up at SHIP's facility ready to "get to work" and guess what...we put away our personal belongings and waited until it was time for dinner. No one told us what to do or how to do it. I truly didn't know what to do with myself. What was the plan? I was not in charge, so there was nothing to tell anyone else to do. We wandered up to the "outdoor dining area/



living room" that became home for the next week. We visited with new faces and exchanged introductions. We drank tea and shared life. We ate dinner and went

to bed. I think I got 12 hours of sleep that night. I would wake up and ask God "what on earth?" and go back to sleep. It was finally time to get up and eat breakfast. Here we were eating again. Sharing life and breaking bread with friends and new faces. Within 24 hours, people were sharing their hearts

with me like never before and opening up in new ways that somehow felt safe so far away from home.

I'm a doer. I was ready to do something, and God spoke to my heart and said "I am the Almighty – the ultimate planner of the universe. I know this team. I see each one of them and know how to put them together. Relax and do whatever you feel called to do each day of the trip." I watched as the Lord pushed people out of their comfort zones – exactly what they needed to grow in a new way. It might be trying to speak Spanish, saying a prayer over the food, leading a devotional, teaching a Bible study, giving a testimony, growing a relationship with the Salvadoran people, or even digging a ditch for a sewer line. Each day after breakfast, we began with a devotional and then heard what opportunities the Lord had for us that day. We then chose a direction and went to work. Some days, it was VBS, some days it was digging a ditch, and some days it was helping to build a house.

So often at home, I hear people say "so much to do and so little time to do it." In El Salvador, it was so different – so much to do but so much "God time" to do it. He knew the needs, and He brought the workers. We asked Him what to do and just did it. We accomplished so much in the short seven days, but I had more authentic fellowship, ate three meals a day with my new family, and got more sleep than I have in years. I came home ready to figure out how to put this practice into my everyday life. God continues to remind me that He is the perfect planner, the one who sees each one of us individually (our strengths and weaknesses), and is the best executer in the universe. Learning to trust Him more each day – that's the never-ending task until Jesus comes back!



God Is on the Move

For our family of four, this was our first mission trip. Our kids are 14 and 11 years old, and one of our thoughts early on was that this trip



would be good for them. God quickly and gently helped us realize that it would be good for ALL of us. Making the decision to go was a step of faith. While there, with distractions removed, our hearts were happy to serve in a variety of ways – ways we felt comfortable and in other ways, where there was a need – even if it was outside our comfort zones. At a planning meeting, we heard all the different needs for Vacation Bible School. While I was trying to decide which roles to encourage my boys to sign up for, my oldest raised his hand unprompted to teach the memory verse on the first day! My youngest eagerly volunteered to help with games! They just did what God had



called them to do. The Lord loves it when we serve Him by serving others. It felt good to know that I was doing something pleasing to God. I was in His will.

He blessed our motivations to serve Him by giving us positive interactions with the people there. We asked if we could visit a school, not really knowing what that would look like. Through a team effort between SHIP staff, interns, and team members, we were able to share the Gospel in Spanish to 18 different classrooms!

At one point on the trip, one of the teenage boys from the SHIP neighborhood pulled a chair up beside

me. Earlier in the week, we had interacted a little – mainly while I watched my kids playing soccer with him. But this day was different. “Robert” seemed to just want to talk, and my boys weren’t around. I had an idea – I looked around and found a bilingual Bible. I wanted to share some of my favorite verses, and I wanted to make sure he understood them. I found a

couple of my favorites, read them in English and then pointed to the words in Spanish and asked him to read them out loud. After a few nods and smiles, I stumbled onto Ephesians 1:16. I was able to communicate to Robert, with the help of the translation on the pages before me, that I was thankful for him and would remember him in my prayers. God provided a creative way for me to get past the language barrier to have a spiritual conversation. The lesson for me in this moment was that even with a language barrier, God provides a way. Am I willing to have spiritual conversations with those right here at home, with no language barrier to overcome? Do I trust Him to provide the words?

I want to live every day and every hour in a way that puts God first. I want to challenge myself every day to put the distractions aside and show compassion to those around me, look for opportunities to turn conversations toward Him, and serve Him by serving others. Our week in El Salvador was spent on things that matter... relationships, talking about Jesus, serving others. I had to go to another country to grow, to be obedient – and to learn the habit of serving Him daily.

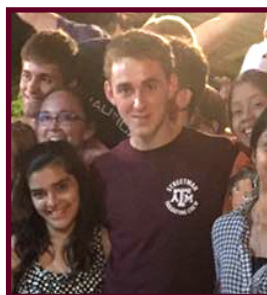

that has to do with my own dreams of financial security.

Working with our team alongside the SHIP staff and interns, I saw firsthand how grateful people in the community were for SHIP's presence there. I thought of all the other communities in El Salvador who didn't have an amazing ministry like this one to show them God's love, and I was reminded that the harvest is plentiful, but the workers are few (Luke 10:2). I was also reminded that real love reaches out past our inner circle of family and friends, to the foreigner, the orphan, the widow, and even the enemy. Love is fluent in every language.

SHIP has invested time and money into ministering

to its Salvadoran neighborhood. They help women learn business skills so they can provide for their families. With the support of their donors, SHIP sends kids to private school and even universities. When SHIP sees a need, they not only pray, but they help meet the need. One night, we had an evangelistic outreach



service and fed 136 people from the neighborhood. We built a house in two days for a family of five. I know that I alone cannot feed all the hungry and shelter all the homeless, but knowing I helped feed some of the hungry and helped build a shelter that created a home for a family is one of the most rewarding experiences I have ever been

a part of. The emotions we felt when the family was expressing their thankfulness for their new house gave us chills. It was such a privilege, with God's help, to play a part in building a home for this family.

The week we spent in El Salvador was non-stop. In addition to the house we built, we also dug about

half the length of ditches needed to install a septic system in another house. We hosted VBS for the neighborhood kids and also had women's and men's Bible studies. Some rebuilt shelves in the laundry room. Others taped, floated, and painted the great room. We hosted a soccer tournament with a devotion time and snacks for the kids. We also sorted boxes of donated clothes that local women can purchase at a very low price in the SHIP Shop and sell, and organized the electrical and plumbing rooms. We helped change the brake cylinder and master cylinder on the SHIP van and helped build 2 tables for the kitchen. Whew!

By helping change the lives of families in El Salvador, our lives were forever changed!
