A SHIP Trip to Remember!

In late June, SHIP took the largest group of volunteers to date to work at the orphanage – 23 people from Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas, and Florida! We had barely unloaded our carry-on bags and the 40 boxes of checked items when the men got busy constructing bunk beds so everyone would have a place to lay their weary bones after a long day of travel.

And so the busy week began!

A variety of tasks were planned for the week. Some built cubbies to place in the



children's bedrooms for their clothing and shelving for the orphanage kitchen and bathrooms. Others painted walls in the learning center area. Still others worked in the "bodega" (storage room), sorting and sizing a "mountain" of donated shoes and clothing so it could be more easily located



when needed. The teenage boys worked with Sam Brown to clear brush and get areas ready for planting. A small bridge was built to replace a plank that was previously used

to cross a large gap.
One brave young man scaled an enormous tree to install a clothesline pulley for the Brown family's use.



In the afternoons, a group went into the neighborhood outside the orphanage gates to begin forming relationships with the children, with the ultimate goal of sharing Jesus with them. It involved lots of playing with the kids, along with

providing some needed clothing and shoes from the newly organized bodega.



Of course, no trip to the

orphanage would be complete without spending some quality time with the kids. In addition to having Vacation Bible School in the evenings, we played soccer with the boys and the girls and taught the girls how to make cookies. In return, the girls attempted to teach us how to make pupusas (a traditional Salvadoran dish). One afternoon was a

time of pampering for the girls as our ladies gave each girl a pedicure, shared verses of Scripture with them about their value in Christ, and prayed over each girl. Our last full day at the orphanage was a play day with the kids, and we took them to a water park in San Salvador. It was a real treat for the kids since they rarely get to do anything like this. Even the boys with muscular dystrophy, who are usually confined to their wheelchairs, were able

to get in the pool with the help of our volunteers – the smiles, especially on the faces of these particular boys, were priceless!



This mission trip was a first for many of the volunteers and a life-changing experience that none of us will forget.



Our next mission trip to El Salvador is scheduled for March 10-17, 2012. God always assembles a diverse team for our trips – and they're exactly the ones we need for the work to be accomplished. We'd love to have you join us if God is calling you to do so.

Needs at the Orphanage

Food. Rice and beans. Beans and rice. Rice and beans. Beans and rice. Rice and beans. Beans and rice. Pretty tiring, right? Imagine that was your diet. At least twice a day, every day, and the supply of that diet is quickly drying up. There's less food on your plate, though you sometimes see things like chicken feet and chicken necks being served up for dinner. That's all there is.

That's what our kids in El Salvador are facing now. Our biggest concern about their diet used to be the quality of their available food. Now, we worry about whether or not they have any food at all.

We know that times are tough economically. That's a big part of why our kids are experiencing a food shortage. Due to the economic downturn, the major food contributor to the orphanage is now unable to help.

That's where you come in. All we need is for people to give a little. (Though, as always, we won't stop you from giving a lot.) We appreciate your financial assistance while we look for a more permanent solution to their food shortage.

Water Well. Water at the orphanage is provided by a public/ private group; however, you have no guarantee of having water when you need it. For example, when you're in the shower with shampoo in your hair, it's not uncommon to find out that there is no water to rinse it out! And sometimes, there is no water for days. The water we do receive is suitable for bathing and cleaning, but it cannot be used as drinking water. We need a well! The estimate for a new well with a pump, purification system, and a generator (for those days when we don't have electricity) is between \$18,000 - \$20,000.

Can you help with these needs?

They're Married!

We have some great news to report from this summer. After 40 years together, Ann and Robert Horton have finally made it official. They got married. Okay, that's not entirely true. They did get married this summer – but for the second time; it was already official.



The wedding was a lovely affair with all the orphanage children serving as attendants. Two ministers performed the service: Jhony Benítez, the orphanage director, and David Archer, a pastor in Edmond, Oklahoma, and a good friend of the Hortons who wasn't able to be in the original wedding due to military service.

The party that followed was a blast for the children, especially the chocolate fountain and delicious cake. But more importantly, the children experienced a wedding, something many of them have never seen. They saw a couple who have stayed together a long time and learned that love and marriage can last a lifetime – a reality for too few couples and a valuable life lesson for these children. It was a wonderful celebration of the Hortons' 40th anniversary.

An Impacting Trip

What impacted me the most about our trip was a comment made by Elena de Benitez when she told the women on our team about how she and her husband began their orphanage ministry. She said that during the years when it was so difficult to pay the bills and afford adequate housing for their family and the children, she often questioned if they had made the right decision in taking in children. But then she said that when we are faced with a child in need, it is not necessary to ask God if it is His will for us to help them. The Bible makes it clear that God expects us to do something to meet that child's needs.

It is a very obvious statement to make, but I had never thought of it that way, and it hit me right between the eyes and in the heart. Whether we should help needy children is not something we have to wonder about. God has already answered that question in His Word, and one specific place is the verse printed on our tee shirts for this trip, James 1:27: "Religion that God our Father accepts as pure and faultless is this: to look after orphans and widows in their distress and to keep oneself from being polluted by the world."

Planting the Gospel

Below are excerpts from a letter Sam and Angela Brown recently wrote about their time in El Salvador to this point and how God is at work in it.

The Lord is moving in a mighty way among the people of El Salvador. It was evident from the beginning that God had gone before us and prepared the way. He had key individuals ready, who would become a big part of a growing ministry in San Salvador. It was a breath of fresh air to be exactly where God wanted us to be. It was home from day one!

Because God had gone before us,

many doors for ministry were opened while we were there. Much of our summer was spent building relationships with the orphanage director and his wife, and the orphans. Sam also teamed up with Dr. Flores, a brother in Christ that God provided, and began forming relationships and teaching English classes to young men in the local community.



The boys spent time learning English, responsibility, respect, and trust. Before Sam left, a large group of 20 boys had formed, and he was able to begin praying with them, handing out Bibles, and reading Scripture. It became obvious to us that one of the older orphans, Richard, is being prepared to enter into ministry. Richard was introduced as the leader of that group of boys and will continue to assist Dr. Flores with the classes, as well as build deeper relationships with the boys.

The acreage that the orphanage sits on was evaluated for fruit and vegetable production as well as reclaiming/ recycling the rain water. Many very tall fruit trees were cut down to a



usable height, and most non-fruit bearing trees were removed. It will take about two years for them to become producing trees again, but when they do produce, they will provide the kids with much-needed nutrition and a means to make money to support themselves. The plan is to bring in a local group that will train the orphanage children to prepare the fruit for selling and storing. This production effort can also be used by the orphanage as a possible community outreach program.

We worked with the kids and alongside the orphanage director this summer, as well as in his local church. Sam became a bus driver who picked up people in the community so they could attend church. I [Angela] was asked to share my testimony to the church using an interpreter. It was well received the first time, so I was able to share again with

> another group of people. I have another church awaiting my return to hear my testimony. I had no idea that God would use me in this way. I was blessed, probably more than anyone!

None of these things would have been possible without people who were praying for us and supporting us financially. We are so thankful for each of you.
