Josh Wesley: Hole-digger, Hug-giver

This past year, I have been to El Salvador twice. In the spring, I heard about an organization called SHIP, Shelter the Homeless International Projects, that was taking a team to work in an orphanage in Central America. I applied to go on the trip and after a few short meetings with the team and many questions from my parents, found myself on a plane headed to San Salvador. Our team was a wonderful mix of people, from college students to retirees, creating an interesting dynamic. It was a rewarding experience to work alongside people from different walks in life but with a similar passion to help others in the name of Jesus.

When we first arrived at the orphanage, it was hard to fathom what we were witnessing. Thirty-six children were living in a 1500 square foot cinder block building without fans, air conditioning, hot water, or reliable water for that matter. SHIP had recently bought twelve acres of land outside of the city with hopes of building a much larger orphanage, which could easily house all of these children and their brothers and sisters who still had nowhere to live.

During our week in El Salvador, we spent our mornings and afternoons at the new property clearing land in preparation for construction. While construction was one goal of the trip, the most rewarding time was in the evenings when we returned to the orphanage and spent time with the kids. We colored pictures, played soccer (poorly), gave hundreds of piggyback rides, and gave each child as much attention as possible. These children were the reason we went.

Christ loves these kids and they need Him just like we do. Hopefully through our actions, meager Spanish and poor soccer abilities, we were able to share the love of Christ.

At the end of the week, I knew that I wanted to go back. Before we left, several team members and I began planning our return trip in the summer. The Lord provided funds and time, and I was able to spend the month of July living at the orphanage with six other students.

God also provided SHIP with the resources to begin construction on the new facility and when we arrived, construction was well under way and we found plenty to do at the worksite. We chopped down countless trees, dug a ten-foot by twelve-foot by ten-foot hole for a septic tank, dug several water drainage trenches and helped the construction crew with whatever they needed. It was tiring work, but every evening as I returned to see the kids I had come to know so well, I was reminded why God had placed me there.

While my summer in El Salvador was one of the most challenging experiences of my life, both physically and spiritually, I would go back without a second thought. I learned and grew in so many ways and still cannot grasp the entire effect this trip had on my life.

Two people who were radically inspiring to me are Jhonny and Elena, the couple who started and still run the orphanage. They exhibit faith, not only with their words (which I couldn't understand) but also by their actions. For example, in the common area of the orphan-

age, there is an old, tattered hammock, faded and falling apart, in desperate need of retirement. The couple had saved up money, purchased a new hammock and were in the process of hanging it up when they heard that a member of their church had injured his back. Due to his injury, he was unable to sleep in a bed and needed a hammock to get some rest. Without a second thought, Jhonny and Elena took their brand new hammock down without ever using it and gave it to the man. This is just a small example of the trust and generosity they exhibited with their lives. It was difficult for me to fathom the faith they have to run this orphanage, with little consistent resources or funds. God has blessed them for their faith and is using them to bless others, including my-

STATE OF THE BUILDING REPORT

SHIP began construction on the new El Salvador orphanage last May. It is an extremely gratifying experience to see the walls rising out of the jungle and know that soon children who have come from abuse, neglect, and abject poverty, will be living in the comfort and safety of the new buildings.

At this writing all walls are standing and some of the roofing has begun. But much still needs to be done before the dream can be realized.

As with any project, the greatest need right now is funding. SHIP needs \$150,000 to complete the work. Please prayerfully consider how you can partner with SHIP to help these children.
